<p>A Range: “<u>A</u>bove and Beyond”</p> <p>To be an “A” worker, you need to really single yourself out. You must do more than expected. You almost always have to be one of the very best.</p>	A+	4+ Surpassing	100%

<p>B Range: “<u>B</u>eing Interested”</p> <p>“B” workers able to do everything required. You are basically fine at what you produce; success is evident in what is asked of you.</p>	B	3+ Proficient	75-89%
<p>C Range: “<u>C</u>ould Have Done Better”</p> <p>“C” workers are always in jeopardy of falling behind the class. Truthfully, most “C” workers could do better; they could become “B range” if they were more hardworking. Many “B” workers have “C-Level” talent but an “A-level” work ethic.</p>	C	3 Meeting	60-74%
